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Ukraine

The New York Times newspaper, signed by John Biden, published [an article](#) outlining the strategic goals pursued by the administration he leads during the current war (see the Russian text of the article below). This is the most serious first-hand policy document, revealing and detailing the position of Biden and his team in relation to Ukraine and Russia since the beginning of the last stage of the Russian-Ukrainian war on February 24, 2022. For regular readers of this blog, nothing in the text is discovery. For neophytes, the news can only be the unprecedented cynicism with which Biden tells “the city and the world” the main message of his text – his de facto invitation to Putin to continue the war against Ukraine.

The main theses of the article are as follows.

1. The very title of the article “ **What America will and will not do in Ukraine**” is a contemptuous mockery of what has been happening not only for the last 100 days, but also 8 years - since the beginning of Putin’s aggression against Ukraine on February 20, 2014. Both in the title, reflecting the main idea of Biden’s text, and in the entire article, there is no mention of Putin’s aggression and its the authors are the Putin regime and personally Putin, who is guilty of this war, of the deaths of tens of thousands of people, of colossal destruction, of monstrous crimes against the citizens of Ukraine. Instead of explaining to the world what Biden (and the United States he leads, as well as its allies) are going to do with the aggressor, violator of world law, looter, murderer - the Russian regime and its leader, Biden shares with the public his plans for what he is going to do with a victim of aggression on the territory of



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2. The main goal of the United States, proclaimed by Biden, is not at all the victory of Ukraine (ayy, Mr. Austin!), not the defeat of the aggressor, not the liquidation of the criminal Putin regime, not the punishment of war criminals and those guilty of crimes against humanity, not the release territories occupied by the aggressor, not even stopping hostilities and not even stopping the killings of tens of thousands of civilians. Not! Biden's goal, it turns out, is the victim of aggression itself - a "*democratic, independent, sovereign and prosperous Ukraine*". But what Ukraine should be like is not Biden's business at all. This is the business of the Ukrainians, this is their country. Biden's business, as the head of the largest and most powerful power in the modern world, should have been something else - to protect the victim of aggression, to restore violated international law, to punish the aggressor. But Biden does not set such goals for himself and his allies. Naturally, he does not promise Ukraine any so-called. "security guarantees", the idea of which was so successfully slipped to the Ukrainian president by Putin's agents in his entourage.

3. Moreover, the wording of Biden's stated goal contains only a vague hint of his intention to provide "*means to deter and protect against **further** aggression*". That is, this is actually a signal to Putin about the lack of great desire on the part of the American side and serious plans to provide Ukraine with the means to repel the "**current**" aggression.

4. In his article, Biden cowardly hesitates to call the ongoing war by the name it deserves, and that is all it is - Putin's aggression, Russian aggression. The most Biden was able to do was to call this war a "moral problem": "*unprovoked aggression, the bombing of maternity hospitals and cultural centers, the forced displacement of millions of people make the war*



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5. So-called. Biden's "courage" manifested itself only in the fact that he, acting in a strange role for him not as the president of a great power, but as an aloof academic observer, decided to think aloud about the possible price for this "moral problem": *" If Russia does not pay a high price for its actions, it will send a signal to other potential aggressors that they, too, can seize territory and subjugate other countries. This will endanger the survival of other peaceful democracies. And it could spell the end of the rules-based international order and open the door to aggression elsewhere, with disastrous consequences for the entire world ."*

6. And how does Biden propose to punish the aggressor? What "high price" is he going to make him pay? And here's how: the most "tough" assessment of the author of the largest military disaster on the European continent since the Second World War, found by Biden, was taken from the arsenal not of the Supreme Commander of the most powerful armed forces in the world, but of the teacher of the younger group of the kindergarten: *" I do not agree with Mr. Putin and find his actions outrageous ."* Biden has nothing in relation to Putin - no threats, demands, claims, even wishes. All his demands, claims, instructions - only to Ukraine.

7. Biden not only does not stutter about the inevitability of the Hague trial threatening a war criminal, he cannot squeeze out of himself the recognition of Putin as responsible for unleashing even a food crisis: *" We will work with our allies and partners to overcome the global food crisis, **exacerbated by Russian aggression** " .*

8. Biden not only defiantly distances himself from his active participation in the defense of



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refusal to carry out any retaliatory actions against the aggressor, against Putin and his regime.

We are not looking for a war between NATO and Russia.... The United States will not try to get him expelled in Moscow". If on the eve of the war Biden gave Putin the green light to attack Ukraine, now he invites him to continue the criminal aggression.

9. Putin, of course, understood Biden a long time ago. But just in case, if Putin still did not fully recognize Biden's invitation to continue the war, the owner of the White House explains it in detail: *"Until the United States or our allies are attacked, we will not directly participate in this conflict, nor by sending American troops to fight in Ukraine, nor by attacking Russian forces ."* In other words, Biden tells Putin: "As long as you do not touch me and my allies, as long as you destroy and rob only Ukraine, rape and kill only Ukrainians, you have complete freedom of hands, I will not interfere".

10. But even this was not enough for Biden - he explains to Putin that at a time when he has a free hand in the war against Ukraine, he, Biden, tied, binds and will tie the hands of Ukrainians in the defense of their homeland: *"We are not we encourage Ukraine and do not allow it to strike outside its borders. We don't want to prolong the war just to hurt Russia ."* In other words, Biden not only encourages Putin to "hurt Ukraine," but also does not allow Ukraine to respond with blows to the aggressor.

11. Some kind of phantasmagoric cynicism and publicly demonstrated inadequacy is impregnated with Biden's concern for the fictitious "climate crisis" and the fight against it during this war: *"we will help our European allies and others reduce their dependence on Russian fossil fuels and accelerate our transition to a clean energy future ."*



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12. Biden once again hypocritically draws a distinction between rapidly admitting NATO members Finland and Sweden (“ *Most recently I welcomed the bids of Finland and Sweden to join NATO, a move that will strengthen US common security and transatlantic security by adding two democratic and highly capable military partners*”) and Ukraine, which today is not only a democratic country, but also, obviously, the strongest military power on the continent, capable of making the most serious contribution to European security, which, however, Biden denies membership in a defensive alliance. Thus, he confirms his agreement with the Kremlin’s formula of “the Russian sphere of privileged interests”, which has repeatedly sounded from the Kremlin recently in the form: “ *Unlike Ukraine, we have no territorial claims against Finland and Sweden* ”, but which essentially means: “ *In Unlike Finland and Sweden, we have territorial claims to Ukraine .*”

13. At the height of Ukraine's carefully considered, completely cynical betrayal was Biden's repetition of his previously regularly repeated mantra of ending the "conflict" through negotiations: " *Ukraine could ... take the strongest possible position at the negotiating table* ", " *The United States will ... support its efforts to achieve an end to the conflict through negotiations* ". The inadequacy of this mantra was obvious even before the start of the current stage of the Russian-Ukrainian war. But to instruct on it now - after February 24, after the shelling and bombing of Ukrainian cities and villages, after the occupation of 21 percent of Ukrainian territory, after Bucha and Mariupol, Sumy and Kharkov, Borodianka and Severodonetsk, after the deportation of more than a million Ukrainians to Russia, in the midst of .n. "de-Ukrainization" and the work of Russian filtration camps for citizens of Ukraine is the same as offering European Jews to negotiate with Hitler after the Wannsee conference adopted a plan for the "final solution of the Jewish question."

Mr Biden is the President of the United States.

The invasion, which Vladimir Putin thought would take several days, is now in its fourth month. The Ukrainian people surprised Russia and inspired the world with their selflessness, courage and military success. The free world and many other countries, led by the United States, have sided with Ukraine, providing unprecedented military, humanitarian and financial support.

As the war continues, I want to be clear about the goals of the United States in this effort.

America's goal is simple: we want a democratic, independent, sovereign, and prosperous Ukraine with the means to deter and defend against further aggression.



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through diplomacy. Every negotiation reflects the facts on the ground [on the battlefield]. We quickly sent Ukraine a significant amount of weapons and ammunition so that it could fight on the battlefield and take the strongest possible position at the negotiating table.

Therefore, I decided that we will provide the Ukrainians with more advanced missile systems and ammunition that will allow them to more accurately hit key targets on the battlefield in Ukraine.

We will continue to work with our allies and partners on sanctions against Russia, the toughest ever imposed on a major economy. We will continue to supply Ukraine with modern weapons, including Javelin anti-tank missiles, Stinger anti-aircraft missiles, powerful artillery and high-precision missile systems, radars, unmanned aerial vehicles, Mi-17 helicopters and ammunition. We will also send billions more in financial aid as authorized by Congress. We will work with our allies and partners to overcome the global food crisis exacerbated by Russian aggression. And we will help our European allies and others reduce their dependence on Russian fossil fuels and accelerate our transition to a clean energy future.

We will also continue to reinforce NATO's eastern flank with the resources of the United States and other allies. And most recently, I welcomed Finland's and Sweden's bids to join NATO, a move that would strengthen overall US security and transatlantic security by adding two democratic and highly capable military partners.

We are not looking for a war between NATO and Russia. While I disagree with Mr. Putin and



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the United States or our allies are attacked, we will not be directly involved in this conflict, either by sending American troops to fight in Ukraine or by attacking Russian forces. We do not encourage Ukraine and do not allow it to strike outside its borders. We don't want to prolong the war just to hurt Russia.

My principle throughout this crisis has been: "Nothing about Ukraine without Ukraine." I will not press the Ukrainian government, either publicly or privately, to make any territorial concessions. This would be wrong and would be contrary to generally accepted principles.

Ukraine's talks with Russia have not stalled because Ukraine has turned its back on diplomacy. They are deadlocked because Russia continues to wage war to take control of as much of Ukraine as possible. The US will continue to work to strengthen Ukraine and support its efforts to achieve a negotiated end to the conflict.

Unprovoked aggression, the bombing of maternity and cultural centers, the forced displacement of millions of people make the war in Ukraine a deep moral issue. I met with Ukrainian refugees in Poland - women and children who did not know what their life would be like, and whether their loved ones who remained in Ukraine would be okay. No man of conscience could remain indifferent to the devastation of these horrors.

Supporting Ukraine in its hour of need is not just the right thing to do. It is in our vital national interest to secure a peaceful and stable Europe and to make it clear that strength does not mean being right. If Russia does not pay a high price for its actions, it will send a signal to other potential aggressors that they, too, can seize territory and subjugate other

I know that many people around the world are concerned about the use of nuclear weapons. At present, we do not see any signs that Russia intends to use nuclear weapons in Ukraine, although at times Russian rhetoric aimed at rattling a nuclear saber is itself dangerous and highly irresponsible. Let me be clear: any use of nuclear weapons in this conflict, on any scale, would be completely unacceptable to us, as well as to the rest of the world, and would have dire consequences.

Americans will stay with the Ukrainian people because we understand that freedom is not free. This is what we have always done when the enemies of freedom tried to intimidate and oppress innocent people, and this is what we are doing now. Vladimir Putin did not expect such a degree of unity and strength of our response. He made a mistake. If he expects us to falter or break in the coming months, he is just as mistaken.

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1. Forecasts of military actions

Starting from March 5, various military and other experts began to predict the imminent - sometimes within a period of 10 days to three weeks - "the exhaustion of the aggressor", "the cessation of bloodshed", "Ukraine's transition to a counteroffensive by the end of May", "complete defeat of Russia in Ukraine":

[March 5, M. Kofman](#) :

...I give another ~3 weeks before these forces are exhausted. Exhausted in terms of combat capability.

[March 10, F. Fukuyama](#) :

The complete defeat of Russia in Ukraine is getting closer.

[March 10, H. Grozev](#) :

...there will be no more bloodshed, and this is the most important thing. I think we are getting close to it. And it's a matter of a week or maybe 10 days.

[March 15, B. Hodges](#) :

The next 10 days will decide this war.

[March 20, M. Kofman](#) :

About two weeks ago, I suggested that the Russian forces have about three weeks before their combat effectiveness becomes more and more exhausted. I think that on the whole it was



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[April 26, A.Arestovich](#) :

Ukraine may launch a counteroffensive by the end of May.

On the other hand, the author of these lines made a different prediction on March 28: [The war will be long](#) .

More than three months have passed.

The situation on the fronts is clear.

What happened to the implementation of the above forecasts - too.

2. Forecasts of military aid

Regarding military aid to Ukraine, almost all observers in late April - early May argued that:

- “everything will change after the meeting at the Ramstein air base”, and now much more Western weapons will be delivered to Ukraine than at the beginning of the war;
- The Lend-Lease law signed by Biden opens up an unlimited supply of American weapons to Ukraine.

The author of these lines [expressed a different opinion](#) : “the *meeting in Ramstein really marked a Zeitenwende (turning point) in the attitude of the current US administration towards Ukraine in terms of military assistance to the victim of aggression. True, it seems that this is not quite the turn that many experts and observers had in mind, who spoke with considerable enthusiasm about the historic meeting in Ramstein, after which everything will change* .



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RAMSTEIN has also repeatedly suggested that the Lend-Lease law may not have material consequences at all in the form of any arms supplies to Ukraine.

A month and a half has passed since the meeting in Ramstein on April 26th.

During the first two months of the current stage of the Russo-Ukrainian war, US military aid deliveries to Ukraine averaged \$ [419 million. per week](#) . However, since April 27 (after the meeting in Ramstein), they have decreased to [158 million dollars. per week](#) , or became 2.6 times less.

As for Lend-Lease, within a month after Biden signed the relevant bill on May 9, no weapons and no military materials were supplied to Ukraine within its framework.

In addition to the above, you should also pay attention to the following statistics.

3. Dynamics of the number of Russian BTGs

Pentagon intelligence [shares](#) its data on the number of Russian BTGs in Ukraine:



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
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In addition, several dozens of BTGs are in the reserve of the VSR - from 34 (according to the [Pentagon](#)) to 55 BTGs (according to [A. Reznikov](#)).

Judging by the dynamics of the total number of armored personnel carriers, the ceiling of the build-up of the aggressor grouping aimed at Ukraine has not yet been reached.

4. Losses of the Armed Forces

At present, five main stages can be distinguished during the current stage of the Russian-Ukrainian war:

- February 24-27 (4 days) - “blitzkrieg”;
- February 28 - March 24 (25 days) - offensive on the entire front;



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
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Апр 19 - May 10 (20 days) - the first phase of the offensive in the Donbass,
- May 17 - June 7 (21 days) - the second phase of the offensive in the Donbass.

Average daily losses of tanks for 5 periods Average daily losses of infantry fighting vehicles and armored personnel



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

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
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Average daily losses of artillery systems for 5 periods




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, the fifth stage of the current stage of the war, according to the General Staff of the Armed Forces of Ukraine, have significantly decreased compared to the previous stages. Depending on the category of losses, they are now 3 to 10 times lower than they were at the blitzkrieg stage.

5. Zelensky's information

According [to V. Zelensky](#) , " *they (the Russians - ed.) have 20 times more equipment in the Donbass .*" Zelensky also said that the losses of the Armed Forces of Ukraine have recently grown to the level [of 60-100 dead and 500 wounded per day](#) .



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
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
It should be noted that the losses of HRV according to data from various sources differ markedly.

HRV losses as of May 26, 2022 from three sources



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




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


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



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
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What conclusions can be drawn from all these facts?

7. Intermediate conclusions

1. Popular hatred statements, promises of "quick exhaustion of the enemy", "rapid transition of the Armed Forces of Ukraine to the offensive", "easy victories" are not supported by facts.
2. Both the number of troops and the advantage in heavy weapons and firepower, as well as the initiative in the conduct of hostilities - all this is still on the side of the VSR.
3. There has not yet been a turn in the war.
4. This is not a quick war, this is a war of attrition, it will be a long one.
5. The task of not defeating (at least) in a long war of attrition requires from the authorities of



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consequences of the war , but a radical restructuring of the military organization, military production, military supplies, the state system, the national economy, the entire life of the country under the only possible slogan of the present time: "Everything for the front! All for victory!"


